SUBJECT:

"Activities and accomplishments contain the same verbs, namely 'process' verbs, which I have defined elsewhere (Mittwoch (1980)) as verbs that can be modified, literally and nonelliptically, by the adverbs *quickly* and *slowly*. The distinction between them depends on the presence or absence of an object NP (or directional phrase, in the case of verbs of motion) and its features if present. A process verb without an object or with an object NP that lacks a quantifier, i.e. that consists of a 'bare' plural or mass noun, enters into an activity; a process verb with a quantified object NP enters into an accomplishment."
